

INFORMATION GUIDE ON FINANCE

I have been accepted on a course at the University of Cambridge; how can I get financial support for my studies?

Depending on your course and other criteria, your College might have their own scholarships or funding awards. You might be able to find this information by contacting the Tutorial Office or the Student Finance Officer in your College. Sometimes, this information might be available on the College's website. If you are a postgraduate student, it might be helpful for you to speak with your course supervisor about possible sources of funding from your department. Please see below a link to a list of the departments at the University of Cambridge: www.cam.ac.uk/colleges-and-departments/department-a-z.

I am a current student at the University of Cambridge, and I am experiencing financial difficulties; is there any support available?

It may be that, at some point during your studies, you might find yourself in financial difficulties which have arisen as a result of unexpected or sudden change in your circumstances. In this case, you can discuss your situation with a variety of people from both the College community and the University. In College, you can access support from your **Tutor**, **Senior Tutor** and, in some colleges, a **Student Finance Officer or equivalent**. If you are a postgraduate student, you might also find it helpful to speak with someone in your department which could be, for example, an administrator or your **Supervisor**.

In addition to any financial hardship support the University can offer, some students may be eligible for extra help from the government. Hardship Funding for Undergraduate Students:

Hardship funding for undergraduate students is provided by the Bell, Abbott, and Barnes Funds, which provides grants of up to £2000 per year. The application deadlines are in the middle of each term. College Tutors apply on behalf of students, as such the University suggests that students should speak with their Tutor as soon as possible to ensure they meet the deadlines for applications. Hardship Funding for Postgraduate Students:

As a postgraduate student, the University expects that you will have budgeted for the duration of your studies; however in circumstances where students find themselves in financial hardship as a result of unexpected changes in their financial situation, they might be able to access the University's Postgraduate Hardship Award. In the first instance, students are advised to discuss their concerns with their Graduate Tutor who should be able to advise them of the options available in their situation. Students can also discuss their circumstances and explore their options with the Student Advice Service. The awards are normally no more than £2000. Postgraduate students who need financial support due to COVID-19 may apply to this fund for assistance.

Assistance with Medical Costs (Crane's Charity):

Crane's Charity is a fund available to students at the University of Cambridge who need treatment for physical or mental illness which cannot be obtained under the NHS. Examples of when funding might be provided include:

- medical, surgical, or psychiatric treatments
- items associated with such treatment (for instance, nursing home, convalescent accommodation, travel etc.)
- treatment for injuries resulting from accidents

Applications are submitted by the College on behalf of the student, with the understanding that Colleges would also be expected to make a financial contribution. For full details on eligibility criteria, how to apply and a copy of the application form, please follow the link provided above.

Special Hardship Fund

This fund has been established for both undergraduate and postgraduate students who are in financial hardship and have exhausted all other options. These funds can also be accessed by intermitting students who have no other available financial support. Students who have 'incurred immediate expenses in excess of their usual expenditure due to COVID-19' can also apply to this fund. Applications need to be submitted by the Senior Tutor of the student's College on their behalf.

Student Hardship Loan Fund (listed as 'Loan Fund I' in the University Statutes and Ordinances)

In exceptional circumstances, where all other options have been exhausted and depending on the student's individual situation, you might be able to apply for an interest-free loan from the **University's Student Hardship Loan Fund**. Sheikh Family Bursaries

The Sheikh Family Bursaries provides financial hardship assistance to undergraduate Muslim home students from all Cambridge College. The maximum award is £2000 per year. As a disabled student, am I eligible for any disability-related financial support?

Disabled students are advised to register with the Disability Resource Centre (DRC). The DRC is the University's disability service, providing advice, information and support to disabled students. Disabled students can apply for assistance with medical expenses from the Crane's Charity (please see above information and links to it), however they would normally be expected to seek assistance with disability-related costs through the Disability Resource Centre. Nonetheless, applications relating to disability will be considered on a case-by-case basis; assistance may be provided, for instance, where the student has acquired a disability since matriculation and where no other financial support is available.

I am intermitting; is there any financial support available to me?

Intermitting students (undergraduates and postgraduates) who find themselves in financial hardship can apply for funds from the **Special Hardship Fund** (www.cambridgestudents.cam.ac.uk/fees-and-funding/financial-hardship-support-access-funds). Please see above for more information about this fund.

If you are a postgraduate student and are intermitting or thinking about intermitting your studies, speak with your Research Funding Council (where applicable) about your situation as there could be financial implications.

In circumstances where an undergraduate student is suspending their studies due to **compelling personal circumstances**, such as ill health or bereavement, the Student Loans Company will consider each case individually and 'do what [they] can to help the student get funding for future study.' (www.practitioners.slc.co.uk/exchange-blog/2017/april/withdrawing-or-suspending-study/). Most undergraduate students are eligible for government funding for their first University degree which is calculated as the length of current course + one year. For example, if a student started their course and intermitted their first year of study, when the student resumes study, they will be able to use the '+ one year' to fund the academic year of their return from intermission. In some circumstances, a student might intermit their study twice. If the student needs to access funding for a second time, they would have to meet the eligibility criteria for compelling personal reasons. The student is expected to provide evidence of compelling personal reasons,

which depending on their circumstances, this could include for example but not limited to: medical evidence from their GP, evidence from social services and evidence from their University or College.

I am an independent (estranged) student. Is there any financial support I can access?

If you are an undergraduate student who is independent or estranged from their biological or adoptive parents, you may be eligible to apply for Estrangement Status with Student Finance in England, Wales or Scotland. The process for making applications for estrangement status, including further information on eligibility and evidence requirements, can be found in the Stand Alone Student Finance Guide (<https://www.standalone.org.uk/guides/student-guide/>). You may also wish to consider speaking to your College Tutor, supervisor or the departmental administrator about possible financial support towards your expenses in support of your research.
